WHAT'S ON THEIR RADAR

Whether they're experts on hotels, homes or restaurants, these five designers know what's hot and what's not in the world of design, as well as how to add their signature stamp to any interior. We asked for their advice on how to make a space tell a story all its own.

Lauren Rottet

President and Founding Principal, Rottet Studios
Project: Hotel Alessandra, GreenStreet

When you were working on Hotel Alessandra, who was your inspiration?

Dominique de Menil, who was such an icon in Houston, and who epitomized the contrast between complete sophistication and the oil business.

What's your most unique design request?

A man in Dallas once requested a fire pole from his office to his father's office, so that when the secretary called him, he would just appear, and no one would know how he got there on foot.

What's your favorite material to work with?

Glass, because it reflects and absorbs, and it's so versatile and durable.

Name one must-have accessory for the home.

White-linen hand towels.

What's your best bang-for-your-buck decorating tip?

Instead of using an accent wall, paint a rectangle on the wall as a backdrop to frame furniture. It's incredibly powerful for holding the eye and giving the wall presence.

Name a home-decorating trend on the rise, and one on the way out.

I hope industrial chic is on the way out! Collectable furniture is on the way in; people are being more discerning with their purchases and want to know the pedigree of the piece before buying.

What's an easy DIY project anyone could do?

If you have a guest coming, fold your towels and washcloths neatly and wrap them with a big ribbon, so they look fresh and special.

Name a simple element that makes a big impact.

Focusing of view. Use your curtains and furniture to direct the gaze through the window towards what's pretty to clean up the ugly.

What's your favorite Houston design-savvy hot-spot?

The Great Hall at the Houston Museum of Fine Arts, where the lovely old building meets the totally modern Mies van der Rohe addition.

Kelie Mayfield and Erick Ragni

What's the most challenging design you completed?

Ragni: As Frank Lloyd Wright once said: "The next one."

Mayfield: We do these art fairs every year that have no budget and an extremely short time frame, and they always need to be installed in three days and taken down in a day. So how do you design a rectangle that looks different every year with these constraints? We learn a lot from these design exercises.

What's your most unique design request?

Ragni: We've designed unusually large showers... that can accommodate lots of people.

Mayfield: For one corporate client,

we did a 60-foot entertaining bar that housed everything from a video art installation, to library bookshelves, to yoga balls and customizable chairs that all folded back in.

What's your favorite material to work with?

Ragni: This is totally the arrogant architect answer, but space.

Mayfield: Mirrors and concrete.

Name one must-have accessory for the home.

Ragni: Nest Thermostat. I just put it in my house, and I love it. It's a smart thermostat that learns based on your behavior and makes your house more efficient.

Mayfield: Sonos player.

Ragni: Interesting that we both went tech.

What's your best bang-for-your-buck decorating tip?

Ragni: You need less space than you think you need.

Mayfield: You don't need formal dining rooms or formal living rooms.

Ragni: Or the guest room. Or an office for him and her.

Mayfield: We help clients realize that space can be convertible, and used in many different ways.

Name a home-decorating trend on the rise, and one on the way out.

Mayfield: Everything is shrinking. People are realizing that they don't need big houses or big offices. Everything is becoming much more efficient these days.

Ragni: And thus we see a rise in multifamily developments, as people become empty nesters and downsize.

Media rooms and

theaters are going out for sure.

Mayfield: Technology is advancing. You can be watching something and take it to your tablet or your iPhone. You don't have to go to that big experience.

What's your go-to design aesthetic?

Mayfield: Modern sensibility.

Ragni: Timelessness with a twist. And a twist is not style. It's personality.

Name a simple element that makes a big impact.

Ragni: Another cheesy one, but something unique and customized to that person.

Mayfield: A first-impression piece. For example, an exaggerated, long, reception, "everything" desk that's a one-of-a-kind, one-off piece. That's one of our signatures.

Name your favorite color pairings.

Ragni: Black and grey.

Mayfield: We like greys.

What's your favorite Houston design-savvy hot spot?

Mayfield: Noguchi Garden, outside the Museum of Fine Arts.

Ragni: Bistro Menil. There's restraint. And that's hard to find in a restaurant. Same with Tiny Boxwoods. It feels organic.







The Culture of Travel

SEEKING ENLIGHTENMENT IN
NEW YORK, LONDON AND CANNES.

The best vacations, we think, give travelers the chance to explore art, music and film, which is why New York, London and Cannes are high on our list of great destinations for 2015. But of course, not everyone can get away, which is why we're glad that when it comes to culture, Houston has plenty to offer, too.


New York City

What makes a city world-class is the amount of culture and arts on offer, and in this, the Big Apple is unparalleled. A bustling metropolis that attracts more than 50 million visitors a year, it's a visual art lover's paradise. You could spend months taking in the amazing permanent collections at the museums alone: works by Vermeer, Rembrandt and Renoir at the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Modigliani and Klee at the Guggenheim (to say nothing of the building itself, a marvel of modernist architecture). Then there's Vincent van Gogh's *The Starry Night* at MOMA, always surrounded by crowds. Of course, these are just a few names among many heavy hitters.

New York gets all the big traveling exhibitions, which is another huge draw for visitors, and the upcoming months bring some especially exciting art events. The Met's upcoming *Van Gogh* show, the can't-miss "Irises and Roses" (May 12–August 16), is expected to be a blockbuster. The Guggenheim's "Hugo Boss Prize 2014" (through May 13) exhibition features sculpture, animated video and light projection works by Paul Chan, who received a \$100,000 prize purse and, by the way, is officially no longer up-and-coming. And travelers won't want to miss MOMA's "Björk," (March 8–June 7) with sound, film, visuals, instruments, objects, costumes and performance pieces by the multifaceted avant-garde artist. The NYC gallery scene, meanwhile, is unparalleled. If days spent wandering the galleries is your idea of the perfect vacation, we suggest doing it by neighborhood. Pick


Chelsea, say, or the Lower East Side, then visit a newsstand for a *Time Out New York* for the skinny on all the latest shows.

For a taste of NYC in town, spend a Saturday exploring what Houston has to offer, either at the bigger institutions of the Museum District, or smaller pockets around the city. At GreenStreet downtown, don't miss Esperson Gallery, whose collection, curated by Tammy Dowe and Carliss Chatman, focuses on local artists or artists with Texas ties. "Art doesn't just happen in New York City," says Chatman. "Houston is a city that should be paid attention to, and there is definitely collectible art that you can buy without leaving the city." See works by established artists such as David Adickes of giant-presidential-head fame, or graffiti artist Gonzo 247, whose murals, including the now-famous "Houston Is" downtown, have been commissioned by the city of Houston.

London


When you think of musicians who changed the rock world, you think of The Beatles, The Rolling Stones or—some of you, anyway—One Direction. What do these guys have in common, other than their ability to make young women swoon? Their United Kingdom heritage.

Edgy, international, perennially cloudy and home to Big Ben, Westminster Abbey, the Tower of London, Buckingham Palace and Queen Elizabeth II herself, London is one of the oldest cities in the world—and one of the most exciting for music fans. In fact, a great way to get to know the city is through a music-history lens, and

for that, try a Rock 'n' Roll Legends tour. There's a whole menu of options, including Pink Floyd's Cambridge and London, Experiencing Hendrix's London, Beatles by Night, Punk & New Wave and much more.

After that, of course, you'll be dying to take in a show at one of the city's music venues. Want acoustic or jazz? Head to Union Chapel, a Gothic masterpiece built in 1877, where the acoustics are spellbinding. Want rock music? Head to the legendary Electric Ballroom, dedicated to all things rock, or to Underworld, located in Camden underneath World's End, the world's biggest pub. Among the can't-miss big-ticket shows coming up: Kylie Minogue plays Hyde Park with CHIC and Grace Jones on June 21; The Who plays Hyde Park on June 26; and Drake, A\$AP Rocky, Kendrick Lamar, Nicki Minaj, Avicii and David Guetta play the New Look Wireless Festival at Finsbury Park from July 3 to 5.

Of course, London isn't the only breeding ground for musicians. Houston lays claim to a large roster of them, of course—Beyoncé, Lightin' Hopkins and ZZ Top among them—not to mention a flagship musical festival, the Free Press Summer Fest, on June 6 and 7, and stellar live music every night of the week. The House of Blues at GreenStreet is one of the city's major destinations, and this summer, its hot tickets include Polica on April 14, The Kooks on April 26, Jason Bonham's Led Zeppelin Experience on June 6 and, of course, its special Gospel Brunch, held on select Sundays and offering incredible gospel music and perfect Bloody Marys. Oh, and for drinks and a meal before a show, head to the House of Blues Crossroads restaurant, located downstairs from the concert venue.

Cannes

A small town on the French Riviera located between Marseilles and Nice, Cannes is a favorite holiday destination for the French, as well as a playground for the international adventurer. Enjoying mild Mediterranean temperatures during the off-season, and sunny, 12-hour days during peak season—March to October, this is a great place to visit year-round, but especially May 13 to 24, when the annual Cannes International Film Festival takes over the sleepy town.

The festival draws celebrities from all over the world every year, so get your camera phone ready for selfies, as during these two weeks the streets are positively teeming with stars. A-list actors George Clooney, Nicole Kidman, Naomi Watts, Brad Pitt and Angelina Jolie—among countless others—have all walked the red carpet leading up to the Grand Auditorium Louis Lumière.

Joel and Ethan Coen, directors of classic movies *O Brother, Where Art Thou?*, *No Country For Old Men* and *True Grit*, will serve as co-presidents of the 2015 festival, the town's 68th annual film extravaganza. While the winner of this year's coveted Palm d'Or title is anyone's guess, past honorees have included Roman Polanski (*The Pianist*), Gus Van Sant (*Elephant*) and Waco native Terrence Malick, whose 2011 film *The Tree of Life* was partially filmed in Houston.

While Clooney isn't a regular at Houston film happenings, the local scene is flourishing, with events like the Houston Cinema Arts Festival attracting more and more attention nationally. We also host lovely outdoor festivals, with "free" and "family-friendly" being the operative words. This spring brings Friday Flicks on The Lawn at GreenStreet, with screenings of *Pitch Perfect* on April 24 and *Jurassic Park* on May 22. Meanwhile, the summer brings CITYCENTRE's Moonlight Movies for Kids in the plaza, kicking off on June 6 with *Big Hero 6*, and *Cinderella*, the animated original, on July 8. Couples and families are encouraged to show up with blankets and snacks for movie night under the stars, complete with free popcorn. And if you like sturdier fare with your films, head to Studio Movie Grill at CITYCENTRE, where there's a full menu offering burgers, pizzas and salads—plus wine, beer and cocktails—along with all the latest releases, making it a little piece of film-fan heaven. ♦

A SPECTACULAR SEAR

THE PROS SHARE THEIR FAVORITE DISHES—AND GRILLING SECRETS.

GRANT MARION, Sharky's Waterfront Grill

Standout dishes: Simple yet savory always wins out here, according to lead chef Grant Marion. "Salmon and the red-fish are the best—simply grilled with lemon butter, rice and veggies."

Grilling tips: "When you're grilling seafood, make sure you have a clean grill and good flame control, and make sure the food is cooked through for food safety," says Marion. "You can serve salmon rare, so no need to cook it through. We grill filets, primarily center cuts that are one to two inches in thickness. You can tell how it's done by the firmness of the fish—this comes with practice. It should still be juicy. If you start to see the fish separate, you've definitely overcooked it."

Standout dishes: The most popular burgers are the Lockheart Legend (topped with applewood-smoked bacon, cheddar cheese, house-made Dr Pepper barbecue sauce, onion rings and dill pickles), the Guacapotle (chipotle aioli, cheddar cheese and guacamole) and the Jive Turkey (turkey patty with pesto, bacon, swiss, sprouts, avocado and chipotle aioli).

Grilling tips: "We aim to serve all our burgers a juicy medium-well," says chef Dylan Salisbury. "Our patties are seven ounces of 100-percent certified Angus beef. We use a typical flat top grill, and it typically takes nine minutes total to grill a burger. Best tip I can give: don't mess with the meat. Put it on the grill and leave it alone for about four-and-a-half minutes, then flip it and leave it for another four-and-a-half minutes."

Standout dishes: The restaurant gets a lot of its seafood from Hawaii. "At least once a week, we'll get ahi tuna," says chef David Hernandez. "We get a lot of heavy spearfish, wahoo, grey snapper, swordfish. We have several composed dishes, but you can get most of them simply grilled."

Grilling tips: "For ahi tuna, you want it to be rare, so the thing to do is to sear it on the outside, so it's still raw in the middle—a quick sear is all you need," says Hernandez. "To keep other types of fish juicy, we constantly brush it with butter and salt. Continue to brush until you flip it. You don't want to overcook fish. We cook it until it's right to the touch. It takes practice, but you

Standout dishes: Not surprisingly, the specialty at this South American restaurant is beef, cooked on a mesquite-wood grill and seasoned simply, with salt and pepper. "We have the highest-quality meat we can buy," says owner Gianfranco Percovich, "from Niman Ranch dry-aged tomahawk ribeye, to grass-fed beef from Uruguay and Australia, to American kobe and more."

Grilling tips: "Always, when you put the meat on the grill, you want to just seal it with a very hot temperature," says, Percovich. "This helps to keep the juices inside the meat. To gauge doneness, you can feel with your fingers, or you can eyeball it; or use both techniques. My advice for a great piece of steak? Be there, love what you do, pay attention."

Standout dishes: The specialties here are fresh fish and steaks. "One of our most popular signature items is the dry-aged, bone-in, Kona coffee-crusted sirloin with shallot butter," says executive chef Jeffrey Meyer. "Another is a feature we do, a porcini-crusted Delmonico steak—a 22-ounce prime bone-in ribeye—served au jus. For fish, the citrus-glazed salmon served with haricot verts and marcona almonds is excellent."

Grilling tips: "When you're cooking beef, make sure you start with a clean grill to get a great sear," says Meyer. "You can brush it with high-smoke-point oil like canola or olive oil if the grill has some rust on it. The ideal thickness of a steak depends on the level of doneness you want. I like a nice, big, thick steak. The thinner ones are easier to cook medium-well to well-done, but if you like a rare or medium-rare steak, thicker is better."



Standout dishes: The churrasco steak is this signature dish at this South American grill. "It's our best seller," says chef Pedro Morales. "It's a tender, juicy, grilled beef tenderloin marinated with chimichurri sauce." Other popular dishes include the bistec de aguja, which is a 12-ounce gaucho-cut ribeye, and the rack of lamb.

Grilling tips: "Grilling a good steak starts with buying good-quality meat," says Morales. "At Chimichurri's, we use the highest quality beef tenderloin, which is basted with our house-made, olive-oil, parsley-and-garlic-based chimichurri sauce for about an hour. The meat should be cold when you place it on the grill, and you want the heat of the grill to be hot, but not too hot—about 400 degrees. We also grill fish, and the key there is starting it on the grill and then finishing it off in the oven."

Taking It Outside

In our city, dining al fresco almost year-round is as much a birthright as free chips and salsa—whether we're out on the town or in our own backyard. Even on the hottest day of August, sitting on a patio, margarita in hand, is perfectly acceptable.

When entertaining friends and family, it's important to remember that hosting outdoors brings its own particular considerations. "Be sure to have enough serving pieces as part of your outdoor collections, like large platters and bowls for casual dinners outside," says Jacob Maurer, Sur La Table's senior vice president and general merchandising manager. "And don't forget lighting for your table, since summer parties often carry on into the evening hours." To keep things safe, use durable dinnerware like melamine plates, which can withstand inclement weather.

Trends this spring and summer include novelty tea lights, decorative candleholders and table scatterers, from crystals, to artificial leaves, to twigs. Natural materials, including plants and wood, and galvanized metals are also popular choices. And what would an outdoor party be without the right server for your refreshing beverages? "The must-have accessory is the beverage jar for serving everything from water, to iced tea, to specialty cocktails," Maurer explains.

Above all, Maurer recommends having fun. "Mix and match patterns, and use decor items and linens to add fun and interest to the table," he explains. Putting it all together can transform a bland deck into a beautiful dining area. Assuming no rain, with the right accessories—and perhaps a little mosquito repellent—there's simply no reason to keep the party inside. ▶

- The best way to put ink on a stamp is to hold the stamp and dab the pad on it, rather than vice versa, so you can see which spots are dry.

- Use a fattier, European-style butter;
- Work the dough with damp hands;
- Relax the dough in the fridge; and
- You can freeze dough for up to six weeks.

If you like wine but don't know much about it, this popular wine bar is here to help. What we learned:

- The safest way to open champagne is by untwisting the wire, taking off the cage and twisting slowly;
- Champagne goes through two rounds of fermentation, the second of which puts the bubbles in the bubbly;
- Only seven types of grapes are in champagne, the great majority of which contain a blend of chardonnay, pinot noir and pinot meunier;
- The grapes in vintage champagne are all harvested in one year (usually a high-quality one); and
- France and America have a gentlemen's agreement, not strictly enforced, that a bottle labeled "champagne" must be made from grapes grown in Champagne, France. ▶
